STUDENT REFLECTION

MADDIE LISCHKA, MA STUDENT, UNIVERSITY OF MANITOBA

This past summer, two University of Winnipeg students (Emily Fedora and Jacee Turner) and I travelled to Belgrade, Serbia to participate in an ongoing multi-institutional project. This project focuses on researching human population migrations in the Balkans during the Early Medieval Period. While in Belgrade, we conducted our research at the Center of Bone Biology, University of Belgrade under the excellent supervision of Dr. Mirjana Roksandic (University of Winnipeg), Dr. Predrag Radović (University of Belgrade) and Dr. Ksenija Đukić (University of Belgrade). We gained valuable experience in examining, scoring, and measuring dental morphological traits from the sites of Čik, Pionirska Ulica, and Jelica-Gradina while learning about the complex history of human interactions and migrations in the Balkans. Plans are underway for the spring/summer 2023 research season. A group of students from the University of Winnipeg will travel to Serbia as part of this ongoing project. Students will begin with an intensive advanced osteology course and participate in fieldwork at several sites throughout Serbia.

NEWS AND UPDATES

IN MEMORIAM (MARGARET) ANNE KEENLEYSIDE

The CABA-ACAB community is deeply saddened by the passing of (Margaret) Anne Keenleyside on October 27th, 2022. Anne has been integral part of the Canadian Biological Anthropology community for over 30 years and her loss is felt deeply by many CABA-ACAB members. Anne was dearly loved and deeply respected by all who had the good fortune to know her.

Anne grew up in Toronto and since grade 10 dreamed of becoming an anthropologist. She earned her B.A. and Ph.D. at McMaster University, her M.A. at the University of Alberta, and her B.Ed. at Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. She became an assistant professor in the Anthropology Department at Trent University in 2002, was appointed to associate professor in 2005, and served as chair between 2013-2017. Anne's contributions to service were extensive and included hosting, with Trent colleagues, CABA-ACAB Annual Meetings in Peterborough in 2006 and 2016. These meetings are remembered fondly by many in our association on personal and professional grounds alike.

Trained as a bioarchaeologist, Anne's research focused on the health, diet and mobility of past populations using macroscopic, microscopic, and chemical analyses. Her fieldwork occurred primarily in Nunavut, Bulgaria, Tunisia, and Siberia. Her work explored the biological impact of European contact on Inuit populations, and the health and dietary practices of Greek and Roman populations of the Mediterranean and Black Sea. Some of Anne's happiest memories were her many travels abroad and research adventures in the field. Amongst her most well-known research was the investigation of the sailors from the 1845 Sir John Franklin Expedition who were attempting to navigate the Northwest passage. In addition to publishing numerous papers, Anne co-authored, with Richard Lazenby, a popular biological anthropology textbook *A Human Voyage: Exploring Biological Anthropology*.

Anne inspired several generations of undergraduate and graduate students, many of whom went on to have successful academic and professional careers in anthropology and beyond. Anne's legacy will go on through her many research contributions, the students she helped train and mentor, and the example she set of how to be both a good person and a good scholar.

Our sincerest condolences go to her family, friends, and all who knew her.

La communauté CABA-ACAB est profondément attristée par le décès de (Margaret) Anne Keenleyside le 27 octobre 2022. Anne a fait partie intégrante de la communauté canadienne d'anthropologie biologique pendant plus de 30 ans et sa perte est profondément ressentie par de nombreux membres du CABA-ACAB. Anne était très aimée et profondément respectée par tous ceux qui ont eu la chance de la côtoyer.

Anne a grandi à Toronto et rêvait de devenir anthropologue depuis sa dixième année. Elle a obtenu son B.A. et son doctorat à l'Université McMaster, sa M.A. à l'Université de l'Alberta et son B.Ed. à l'Institut d'études pédagogiques de l'Ontario. Elle a été embauchée comme professeure adjointe au département d'anthropologie de l'Université Trent en 2002, nommée professeure agrégée en 2005 et a occupé le poste de présidente entre 2013 et 2017. Les contributions d'Anne pour l'association ont été nombreuses et compriment l'organisation, avec des collègues de Trent, des réunions annuelles du CABA-ACAB à Peterborough en 2006 et 2016. De nombreux membres de notre association gardent un excellent souvenir de ces réunions, tant sur le plan personnel que professionnel.

Bioarchéologue de formation, Anne a axé ses recherches sur la santé, l'alimentation et la mobilité des populations passées en utilisant des techniques d'analyse macroscopique, microscopique et chimique. Ses travaux de terrain se sont déroulés principalement au Nunavut, en Bulgarie, en Tunisie et en Sibérie. Ses travaux ont porté sur l'impact biologique du contact européen sur les populations inuites ainsi que sur la santé et les pratiques alimentaires des populations grecques et romaines de la Méditerranée et de la mer Noire. Parmi les meilleurs souvenirs d'Anne figuraient ses nombreux voyages à l'étranger et ses aventures de recherche sur le terrain. Parmi ses recherches les plus connues figure l'enquête sur les marins de l'expédition Sir John Franklin de 1845 qui tentaient de franchir le passage du Nord-Ouest. Outre la publication de nombreux articles, Anne a coécrit, avec Richard Lazenby, un manuel populaire d'anthropologie biologique intitulé *A Human Voyage : Exploring Biological Anthropology*.

Anne a inspiré plusieurs générations d'étudiant(e)s de premier cycle et des cycles supérieurs, dont beaucoup ont poursuivi une carrière universitaire et professionnelle réussie en anthropologie et au-delà. L'héritage d'Anne se perpétuera à travers ses nombreuses contributions en recherche, les étudiant(e)s qu'elle a formé(e)s et encadré(e)s et l'exemple qu'elle a donné en étant à la fois une bonne personne et une bonne chercheuse.







Anne was a long-time member of CABA-ACAB, and a graduate of the University of Alberta (M.A.) and McMaster University (B.A. and Ph.D.)

3. **Report from the President Andrea Waters-Rist**

3.1. Updated numbering of Annual Meetings
